## **Light for the World**

"You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hid. No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven."

Matthew 5:14-16

It seems that everywhere we look we see darkness. Violence, hatred, disrespect, intolerance. Or perhaps a better way to put it is that there seems to be fewer and fewer lights of hope and goodness.

Part of this is the way the media works. Fear, danger, and sensationalism sell. There isn't much money in reporting good news. But I am afraid that part of the growing darkness is that there might be fewer "lights" out there to brighten our world because of the culture of divisiveness in our country. It seems that the way to deal with those who believe differently is to condemn, mock, label as stupid or worthless.

In order to be a light, you have to risk. You have to put yourself on the line. Risk-taking makes us vulnerable to those who like to do nothing but find fault with others.

As Christians we are to be lights to our community—to be an inspiration to others that point to God. It is scary in this world of cynicism, division, suspicion and intolerance of others who believe differently to put ourselves "out there"; to reveal our faith. Yet that is exactly what Jesus challenges us to do.

Jesus calls us to be a light to our community. He calls us to follow him in practicing forgiveness, non-violence, justice. He calls us to accept others who may be different. He calls us to offer hospitality to those who are hurting and rejected.

St. Francis of Assisi wrote "All the darkness in the world cannot extinguish the light of a single candle." The fact that there seem to be fewer lights of goodness around us should not cause us to hide our lights; it should inspire us to shine brighter so that others may see the light of Jesus through us.

Our country, not to mention the world, seems to be spiraling into a morass of confusion and depravity of all kinds: men thinking they are women, and vice versa; killing of the powerless and unborn, and selling of their body parts for profit (and we thought the Nazis were bad!); mass murders in the name of religion; racial hatred on the rise again, and enabled and encouraged by our leaders and media; women and young girls being exploited sexually or even sold into sexual slavery; men constantly in danger of being accused of

rape or sexual assault; increased child abuse; more and more single parent families, often leading to poverty, more child abuse, and delinquent children (because of family instability); hostile and disrespectful language towards anyone who disagrees with one's own beliefs; protests that turn to violence and violent rhetoric; anti-Semitism, now coupled with Christian-bashing, becoming more acceptable and common; laws being re-written by judges and presidents, or simply ignored; a double-standard with the law—one for the rich and powerful, one for the poor and powerless.

Of course, we forget that things like this have been going on since Adam and Eve were kicked out of the Garden of Eden. We like to think that people are basically good; but history continues to prove that we are basically bad, and some of us are very bad indeed. We need to be restrained from evil. If we will not do it ourselves, we will have to be restrained in other ways. There are plenty of people out there who would like to be the ones telling us how to live. There are many human standards of right and wrong—and they cannot all be correct. We need a final authority. Either that authority will be the powerful (government or rich and strong people) or God. Who would you rather trust?

## **Church Council Minutes – July 17, 2016**

Boyd called the meeting to order; Jeff Smith opened us with prayer. Jimmy Stone did a short devotional, calling us to fix our attention to God, and do not get caught up in the culture.

There were no corrections to the June minutes. Keith Keener made a motion to approve them; 2<sup>nd</sup> by Jeff Smith. Minutes passed as written.

Financial Report from Jo Nell Harrison: We spent more money in June than we took in. We hope that, once vacation time is over, our offerings will go up again. VBS, staff gifts/bonuses, youth trip, a new desk for the parsonage, awnings for the CLC breezeways, and other items put us over for the month. We are still on budget — ahead of the budget, we just had a lot of extra expenses in June.

Mortgage report: We still owe \$131,000+ on the CLC loan. People's Bank wants to raise the finance charge slightly. They have offered a 10 year balloon payment loan that would lower our monthly payments for 5 years, but after that time, the interest rate may rise again for the remaining principle.

Jerry Kohnle made a motion to continue with People's; Seconded by unknown. Motion passed. Jo Nell will try to get the interest rate back down to the original 4.6%, instead of going up to 4.85%.

#### OLD BUSINESS

Toilets, etc. have not been repaired yet. The trustees will work on getting this work competed. The cleaning crew problem is resolved. CLC outside lights problem has been

corrected. Jimmy is still working on the Wi-Fi for the nursery. Communion linen has not been bought yet. Smell in the men's restroom continues, and will be investigated further.

SPPR Committee Report: The Youth Minister qualifications' list is completed. We will post the job notice in various venues, such as the Conference website, nearby seminaries, colleges, etc.

#### NEW BUSINESS

There is a **roof leak** in the choir room under the flat roof area. Someone has been called to take care of that.

**Dirty filters** were the reason for the air problem in the CLC; the filters have been changed. This needs to be done on a regular schedule. The trustees are looking into getting a maintenance schedule from the AC people to take care of this. If it is too costly, the men's group will handle the filter changes.

Concerning the **bowed Nursery floor:** Kevin Simmons will cut out the bad laminate and then place tile at the door. He will also fix the bowed ceiling tiles in one of the Sunday school classes up stairs.

Bleaka Hollar brought up the problem of mulch being washed away outside. She asked if borders could we put around the area to stop that? She would like to add a couple of small trees to the area also. The Trustees will make that decision; Bleaka is willing to put out the trees.

Playground equipment: The wooden items will need to be replaced in the near future. We will not replace this year, but should look at it next year.

Kim Ellis: Since we need to clean out the mechanics rooms, we may want to look at buying or building an outside storage building, especially for the larger items we need to store.

Jessica Haas said she needs a DVD

drive for Children's Church. The separate, external drive will cost about \$40. Keith and Boyd gave her \$40 to buy it with. Problem solved.

VBS nightly attendance average this year was 164 a night. Sunday night was our highest night, and Thursday night had great attendance, too. The counts were down a little from last year.

Steve Kohnle reported that the Men's group wants to do a fundraiser to help out a family in the church dealing with illness and unemployment. The men will pay for the food, so all the proceeds will go to the family. They will serve breakfast on July 31st at 8:00 a.m. We will also have the covered-dish on this day as previously planned. Donations will be appreciated, even if you choose not to eat.

Rev. Jay asked about buying a clock for the sanctuary, but decided to place a watch on the pulpit instead.

Gerald Frye prayed us out, and the Council was adjourned.

The God revealed in the Hebrew/Christian Bible is a God of power and wrath, but also a God of righteousness and redeeming love. He knows all and sees all, so he cannot be deceived or deceptive. He created us, so he knows what is best for us. He cared enough for us to come here, become one of us, and die a horrible death to redeem us—if we will accept the gift. He is our only hope for true restraint against evil, in us and in our societies. He is our only hope for a brighter tomorrow—here and in the hereafter.

In this present morass, we Christians should stand out like sore thumbs, or a better analogy would be like a lighthouse in the midst of a dark storm—a storm of evil. If you do not stand out from the crowd, pray long and hard about your life choices. A relationship with Jesus involves change every day. We are not of this world, only in this world (see John 17:14-16, et. al.). Join a Sunday school class, along with attending our worship services and reading in the Bible daily, and you will be better prepared to navigate the waters of this storm in our world today.

"In the Lord's name, then, I warn you: do not continue to live like the heathen, whose thoughts are worthless and whose minds are in the dark. They have no part in the life that God gives, for they are completely ignorant and stubborn. They have lost all feeling of shame; they give themselves over to vice and do all sorts of indecent things without restraint. That is not what you learned about Christ! You certainly heard about him, and as his followers you were taught the truth that is in Jesus. So get rid of your old self, which made you live as you used to—the old self that was being destroyed by its deceitful desires. Your hearts and minds must be made completely new, and you must put on the new self, which is created in God's likeness and reveals itself in the true life that is upright and holy." —Ephesians 4:17-24 GNT




