

Something to Pray About by Cindy Sears

"I tell you," said Jesus, "the tax collector, not the Pharisee, was in the right with God when he went home. For those who make themselves great will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be made great."

HUMBLE OR PERFECT

Are you a perfect person? Or a perfect employee, wife, husband, son, daughter, leader, follower, giver, receiver, teacher, or student...? If not, do you expect other people to be perfect? Do you insist that others never say a word that inadvertently hurts your feelings? Do you expect your boss to always make the 'right' decisions at work? Do you get angry when your child or spouse doesn't behave in the way you want them to behave? Are you offended when someone close forgets your birthday? Do you become agitated when anything doesn't go your way? Do you assume that other people believe or should believe everything exactly as you believe? Do you think all people who vote Democrat or vote Republican are idiots or evil? Do you withhold help from any person that doesn't fit your idea of a 'good' person—or at least someone who is trying to be a 'good' person? Do other people's mannerisms or style of dress or choice of music or reading materials turn you off or even disgust you? Do you disparage people who find it difficult or impossible to remain financially sound? Do you look down on individuals who are addicted to drugs, overeating, smoking, pornography, or who complain constantly? Do you feel superior to anyone or any reason?

"I thank you, God, that I am not greedy, dishonest, or an adulterer, like everybody else. I thank you that I am not like that tax collector over there. I fast two days a week, and I give you one tenth of all my income." —Luke 18:11-12

Are you a perfect Christian? Are you a perfect church member?

We all make mistakes. We all fail to live up to even our own standards. So why should we belittle anyone else when they fail—for any reason?

"Do not judge others, so that God will not judge you, for God will judge you in the same way you judge others, and he will apply to you the same rules you apply to others." —Matthew 7:1-2

Non-Christians love to use these verses to stop Christians from pointing out sinful actions, but Jesus is not telling us to turn a blind eye to sin here. He is telling us to remember that we are sinners, too. To help someone else turn from their evil ways, we must be willing to admit to our own waywardness, our own weaknesses, and repent ourselves—then, because of our own experiences, we are better able to lead others into more righteous living.

"Why, then, do you look at the speck in your brother's eye and pay no attention to the log in your own eye? How dare you say to your brother, 'Please, let me take that speck out of your eye,' when you have a log in your own eye? You hypocrite! First take the log out of your own eye, and then you will be able to see clearly to take the speck out of your brother's eye." — Matthew 7:3-5.

The word hypocrite is our clue here. Do not accuse someone else of a sin that you are indulging in yourself! Yet, it is necessary to point out sins that we have conquered in our own lives (or never gotten caught up in). Remain humble when you are calling others to righteousness—and be on guard. Satan will dearly love it if he can entrap you in the same sins you are speaking out against.



Perfectly Forgiven

That's why being welcoming isn't about telling people that they are free to do whatever they want. It's about assuring them that they don't have to pretend to be strong when they're not. They don't have to pretend to be going from strength to strength when, in reality, they're barely holding on.

It's also about a willingness to accept and even embrace the reality that inconsistency, unsteadiness, and failure are a part of the Christian life. R.C.




