Some Reasons to Pray

We hear on a regular basis, "I have a prayer need or would you pray for my? (Fill in this blank)

During our morning worship service we often pray for the sick and those facing surgery or treatment.

Relationships are often on our list, especially our relationship with God. The recently married or those facing turmoil in their lives are part of the relationship prayer.

Those planning mission trips or missionaries, local or international, are part of our prayer focus. We remember they go representing God as well as the church or organization that sends them.

Those in dangerous or stressful situations are in our prayers. Our emergency personnel, medical, fire, and law enforcement stand in the need of prayer. Their lives are often in danger for our protection.

As we pray for our own, we must remember international situations. These often occur in areas with limited resources and are in great need.

Expectant mothers and fathers, and those who celebrate new families need prayer. The stress level is often at a high level. Raising children has always been stressful and today is probably more difficult.

The families caring for older family members often struggle beyond belief. The needs mount up as they work to provide and protect.

Pray for the leaders of the church as they strive to help us draw closer to God and understand our position with the Holy Trinity.

For example, Sunday school leaders, musicians, choirs, and communion stewards need to be remembered, but also the Scripture readers and especially the pastor. He or she works to bring a message from the Holy Scripture that helps the parishioner live through the week and hopefully be closer to God and do God's will.

We will soon have our annual Vacation Bible School. Pray for the leaders, teachers and helpers and all the children and the families they represent. Ask God if you should step up and take part in VBS. *We need you!*

DRY SPELLS & WAITING ON GOD

The Bible is full of stories of the people of God going through dry spells or famines, and times of waiting on God to act or to move them to a place of victory or peace or prosperity. So why do we think that our lives should always run smoothly; that we should never have to deal with financial or physical problems; or that our religious feelings should always be on a "spiritual high"? Do we think that since we know Jesus and have accepted him as our Savior, that we will be blessed in all that we do now? Were the apostles blessed in all that they did? All but one of them died a martyr's death; and even that one, the Apostle John, was almost killed.

Jesus promised us blessings, but not worldly blessings. Jesus also promised us that we would be persecuted for our faith (see Matthew Chapter 5). Jude, Peter, and Paul warned us that false teachers and teachings would infiltrate the church, and that the devil would be roaming about "seeking whom he may devour". In the book of Revelation, seven churches are described—and all but one is rebuked in some way by the Lord. All of the churches have problems coming from the outside or the inside or both. The early church described in Acts and the New Testament letters was financially poor, but rich in devotion and good deeds, growing daily. They dealt with inner church problems, too. Yet, they could worship and praise God fervently in the midst of it all. How?

Abraham waited into his 90s for a son to be born to him. Jacob worked for 14 years to get the woman he loved, Rachel. The Israelites and Moses wandered in the wilderness for 40 years before entering the Promised Land; and Moses wasn't allowed in. Before that, several generations of Israelites worked in Egypt and ended there as slaves before God called them out. The prophet Elijah lived alone by a slowly drying up brook during a drought. He was fed by ravens, scavengers, who brought him bread and meat twice a day—no desserts, no fancy foods, not even something different once in a while. Then, he went into a foreign area and lived with a widow woman, surviving on bread made with oil—nothing else—as the drought continued.

Prosperity is a common feature in the United States. Even the poorest among us live better lives than many do in other countries in the world; and certainly better than many lived in the past. But are we richer in our faith, or poorer because of this prosperity and lack of overt persecution? Are we so used to being well-fed and entertained that we cannot abide a little boredom, a little lower standard of living because we give to the church, a little less of a spiritual high, a little more difficulty in setting aside time for reading God's Word, or praying?

Are we faithful enough to wait upon God during our dry spells, or do we avoid thinking about him at all when we are feeling down, or suffering


Biscuit Sales

make life good, even when bad things are happening—because God is good!



hardships, or facing what appear to be unresolvable situations?

But they that wait upon the LORD shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall run, and not be weary; and they shall walk, and not faint. (Isaiah 40:31 KJV)

Can we pray when we don't feel like praying? Can we read the Bible when we've read the same words over and over again? Can we continue to give to God's work, when we see others having more because they don't give? Can we attend church faithfully when we don't feel well, or don't like the music, or don't like the preaching? Being faithful does not mean being comfortable or inspired or entertained—it just means being there and doing what God wants you to do—and to do that, you must be in conversation with him—in prayer, in worship, in study of his Word. Let's keep the faith, whether we feel like it or not.

David Crouse began the meeting at 4:00 p.m. Devotions from Luke 11: now that the Christian Life Center is paid for, it is time to get back to the basics. March meeting minutes were read. Motion to accept them as read, seconded by Marsha. Motion carried.

Jo Nell: Finance Report.

Jo Nell made a motion to change the Food Ministry, and take funds from the General Fund to support this from now on. The motion passed.

Re: UMM funds. Jo Nell will write a check to the men's group so they can put these funds in their bank account.

We took in less income than budgeted, but we seem to be able to pay for everything we need to at this point.

Kim Ellis: could not get the pool for VBS commencement. She is not sure if we will even have a commencement this year. Father's Day is unsettled. Kim asked for more funds IF she decides to rent the big water slide. We decided to call a special meeting if we need to vote on this later.

Kim also asked us to be in prayer about the next conference, and who to vote to send to General Conference.

Roy Hamby, Trustees: the new kitchen door is in. The new BBQ building has been delivered; we are waiting to have it put in. Left over wood from old shed needs to be taken away—if anyone wants it, let Roy know.

There was general discussion about putting in a covered area for loading and unloading from cars when it is raining. They are still thinking about this.

Pastor Tom report: All American Sunday will be on July 28th. June 2nd will be graduation Sunday.


