Something to Pray About by Cindy Sears

"Remind your people to submit to rulers and authorities, to obey them, and to be ready to do good in every way. Tell them not to speak evil of anyone, but to be peaceful and friendly, and always to show a gentle attitude toward everyone."—Titus 3:1-2 GNT

HOW HARD

"A great many Americans have come to the conclusion that they cannot, in good conscience, vote for either one of the two turkeys being served up on the presidential platter, and with no choice, are simply going to sit back.

"Rejoice, for there is one name, while sounding subversively Soviet, and not appearing on the ballot, deserves to be written in [as] a personal statement from the voter to the government. When that day comes, let those who feel as they do go out and vote, and cast their write -in vote for Nonoff Z. Abov."

Can you guess when the above was written? (See p. 5 for the answer.)

Even though the United States of America remains the most free nation on earth, that freedom is under attack—and has been for a long time. How long will we be able to hang onto our freedoms? Only God knows for certain.

Many Christians have begun to wonder how much support they can give to a government that seems hell-bent on following the devil's agenda instead of God's. Well, God has given us some directions on this issue.

Besides the verses quoted above, the Apostle Paul had this to say about our relationship with the state:

"Everyone must obey state authorities, because no authority exists without God's permission, and the existing authorities have been put there by God. Whoever opposes the existing authority opposes what God has ordered; and anyone who does so will bring judgment on himself. For rulers are not to be feared by those who do good, but by those who do evil...They are God's servants and carry out God's punishment on those who do evil. For this reason you must obey the authorities—not just because of God's punishment, but also as a matter of conscience. That is why you pay taxes, because the authorities are working for God when they fulfill their duties. Pay, then, what you owe them; pay them your personal and property taxes, and show respect and honor for them all." (See Romans 13:1-7 for the full statement.)

Do you know what was going on in the Roman Empire when Paul wrote those words? Christians were being persecuted by the state—and killed. Tax collection is highly corrupted, too. So, why did Paul command

Church Council Minutes — August 21, 2016

Attendees: Rev. Jay Bissett, Becky Clark, Sonya Crouse, Kim Ellis, Gerald Frye, Roy Hamby, Jo Nell Harrison, Bleaka Hollar, Boyd & Emily Johnson, Connor Johnson, Keith keener, Joann Knepp, Steve Kohnle, Judy McCrary, Libby McRary, Scott Miller, Kevin Miller, Linda Moretz, Cindy Sears, Jeff Smith, Alice Hill, and Ricky Baker.

Boyd called the meeting to order and Gerald Frye opened us with prayer. Boyd read a devotional based on Psalm 121: on the faithfulness and protectiveness of our Lord God.

The minutes of the July meeting were read and approved.

Financial Report: Our cash-on-hand is down a little, because so many people were off on vacations. It was brought up that we have \$1,000 in the Merrill Orphanage Fund. This was donated for Eric's planned mission trip there. Should we donate this to the orphanage? Cindy will check on that to see how the money was originally designated.

We have gone over the budget some on the building maintenance, because of repairs. We are also over on our special events, and a few other items.

Motion was made to officially designate Boyd Johnson, Council Chair, and Keith Keener, chair of the Trustees, as signers of the new mortgage note. Motion by Steve Kohnle to approve; second by Gerald Frye. Motion passed.

Trustees Report: Much of the repair work has been done, but there is still one toilet and sink with a problem. Bleaka's Sunday school class will plant some myrtle trees out front. The air filters have been replaced.

Roy Hamby brought up that the Heavenly Sonlighters' class wants to do a thermometer to show where we are on paying off the CLC mortgage. It will be displayed and updated constantly.

On Saturday, Oct. 8th from 6-10:00 a.m. the men and youth group will have a breakfast fundraiser with all proceeds going to the Van Fund.

Bleaka asked the church to pay for the annual barbecue benefit supplies, and they will reimburse the church from the proceeds. Motion made to do so, and seconded by Keith Keener. Motion passed.

Jo Nell and Kim brought up some phone problems. Cindy will call Charter and have them come check the problems.

Concerning the search for a Youth Minister: Jay said there will be a meeting next week with some applicants. Tasha Haas will be rolled off the committee. Scott and/or Terri Miller will join the committee instead.

New Business

Kim Ellis reminded us that we need to replace the sign at the bottom of the outdoor sign with worship times, because it still has Eric's name on it. Keith Keener (Trustees) will take care of

Some problems with doors were discussed. The glass door of the CLC sometimes does not close properly. It may need to be adjusted. Cindy brought up that the kitchen door has a problem also. Keith will check into both problems.

From Jay: the Charge conference will be on October 23rd. A Safe sanctuary class is scheduled for September 11th. We will need to approve the apportionments at the conference, but the whole budget is not required.

A District Dialogue is scheduled for Nov. 13th at 3:00 p.m., and Jay needs to bring one or more church leaders to this. Roy Hamby volunteered to go with him. If anyone else wants to attend, please see Jay.

Caldwell United requested \$250 to help fund the Youth Fest at Mulberry Rec. Center on Sunday, October 2nd, 3-6 PM. Scott Miller gave permission to take that amount out of the youth fund.

Jay said that he had met with the new principle at Gateway School, and he wants to continue the partnership with our church. Kim brought up that Gateway has a Store that is used as a reward system. She asked if we could contribute to that store, and made a motion to give \$250. The motion was seconded and passed.

doing a new picture directory using a company that would not charge us any upfront cost, but we will need to coordinate it. Jay will talk to several different companies, and he will bring more information to us on that. The projected time frame for doing it is spring of 2017.

Jay also wanted to know how to do special giving requests. We decided to announce a love offering on the first Sunday in Sept., and then take up the offering on the 11th. This offering will be going to UMCOR for flood relief in Louisiana.

Homecoming: Jay said that there were no former pastors available to speak on Oct 9th, so he'll be glad to do the service. Jay will work on getting speakers for the Revival that will run Sun-Wed. We will ask that our members and affiliates help us raise \$10,000 over and above our regular offering goal again, too. This money will be paid on the Christian Life Center mortgage's principle.

We need volunteers to help with the BBQ on Sept. 11th-15th for the BBQ, which will be on the 16th and 17th. We especially will need people to help deliver on Friday at lunch time when we prepare plates for area businesses. Plates will be \$9. Baked apples will be the dessert on the business plates. We need lots of cakes and pies, etc. to serve with the in-house and take-out plates in the evening and on Saturday. Start baking now. You can bring your products to the church, and we can put them in our freezer if you don't have room to store them at home.

obedience to the authorities of such a cruel government? Is there any time when a Christian is obligated to resist the rulers and authorities of the state or the church?

In Acts, Chapter 4, we read of how Peter and John refused to stop preaching about Jesus when ordered to cease and desist by the Jewish authorities. But there is nowhere in the Bible where open rebellion against the state or religious authorities is called for or sanctioned. We do not bow down to Caesar to worship him, but we do not pick up arms to oppose him either. (Though God does move nations to conquer other nations because of rampant evil.) Yet, Paul used every means available to him legally to fight against his own persecution by the Jews and the Romans.

As people living in a democratic republic, we have recourse to law and to the vote—to choose our leaders, locally and nationally. All of our choices are flawed in some way, because we have "all sinned and fallen short of the glory of God." So, as in this presidential election, we must choose between two flawed people. But if we don't choose, aren't we simply letting someone else choose for us?

We also have the freedom to speak out about our beliefs and opinions, and to protest (peacefully) against things going on in our society. But we can only keep the liberties that we are willing to defend—no matter the cost to us personally. Peter and John were imprisoned and whipped. Other Christians, including Paul, were murdered by the state. Is voting or writing our governmental representatives so difficult that we refuse to defend or speak out for what we believe is right?

Regarding the quote at the beginning of this article, I am not advocating for a "write-in" vote. That would just be thrown away. I believe that voting for a third party candidate is basically throwing away one's vote, too. The media are concentrating on the personalities of the two main candidates, because that is the perfect way to keep us from thinking about who to vote for because we are consumed by feelings or emotions. What we need to do is decide which political party's platform we agree with or can support the most. (First, you have to read them!) Again, remember that perfection is not available in either group's agenda. As a Christian, I want to choose the platform that most closely conforms to biblical truth (you'll have to read and study the Bible to discover that, too), and that will increase our liberty, not decrease it. Don't sit this one out. Read the agendas, and vote! Don't forget that God is in control, and He is the only true and lasting answer to all our problems, individually and corporately. \odot


