Something to Pray About

THE PERIL IN POSSESSIONS

Make certain that you do not forget the LORD your God; do not fail to obey any of his laws that I am giving you today. When you have all you want to eat and have built good houses to live in and when your cattle and sheep, your silver and gold, and all your other possessions have increased, be sure that you do not become proud and forget the LORD your God who rescued you...So then you must never think that you have made yourselves wealthy by your own power and strength. Remember that it is the LORD you God who gives you the power to become rich. He does that because he is still faithful today to the covenant that he made with your ancestors. Never forget the LORD your God or turn to other gods to worship and serve them. If you do, then I warn you today that you will certainly be destroyed. If you do not obey the LORD, then you will be destroyed just like those nations that he is going to destroy as you advance. —Deuteronomy 8:11-14a, 17-20 GNT

"Affluence brings spiritual dangers. The temptation to say "My power and the might of my hand have gotten me this wealth" is universal (Interpreter's Bible, vol. 11, p. 388).

The Christian Church and the United States in general are in grave peril today. We have gotten too comfortable with our wealth—and I am not only talking about the super wealthy, the millionaires and billionaires and above. Most Americans are used to a lifestyle that is way above that of 85-90% of the people living in the world today. We live in the wealthiest nation on earth. Most of us live a life made easier by machines and technology that would seem to be magic to bygone eras, or to many people living in other countries. Even some of the poorest among us have much more than many of the kings of past eras.

Many of our Christian churches have grand buildings with lots of technological innovations, and comfortable additions unheard of in previous generations. The Christian Church in the U. S. has been the biggest giver of charity here and abroad; and the largest supplier of missionaries, but that is changing. Today, the majority of Christians give less than 2% of their incomes to the Lord's work. So, much of that wealth is no longer being used to help spread the Good News (gospel) message, or provide for the needy. We Christians have shifted much of our charitable work onto the shoulders of the government (often forced to do so by government, but we haven't fought too hard against it either).

We have so much to spend on ourselves—and we do. Buying and enjoying good things is not a sin in and of itself. But our attitude toward our possessions can be perilous to our spiritual and physical well-being. Have our possessions become our new god? Is our own comfort and enjoyment more important than winning people to Christ?

And what is your attitude toward your possessions? How often do you thank the Lord for your possessions? We work hard to earn money to buy those possessions, and it is easy to believe that we did it all ourselves. But did we? If God did not provide the air you breathe, would you be able to work? If God did not provide the sunshine and rain, would we be able to grow crops, or raise farm animals for eating? Could we live without water or sunshine?

Pride is the root of all sin leading to envy and coveting, and then to lawlessness, corruption, and chaos. Gratitude is the root of all goodness, happiness, and peace. If you are grateful for the sun and rain, for the food on the table, for the clothes you have, the people you know and live, work, and play with, and all good things in your life; you are much less inclined to be grouchy, worried, petty, selfish, and hateful to other people—or to become a thief. Yet, most importantly, an attitude of gratitude keeps your mind set upon the Great Giver, our Lord and our God; because He is the ultimate giver of all good things in this world.

Do not let possessions harden your heart against God or other people. Do not depend upon money or things. You can lose both in a heartbeat—often through no fault of your own. Learn to be content with what you have now. Be willing to give anything and everything up if God calls you to do so. We possess things and money here and now, but we are only stewards of these things. God blesses us materially, so that we have the means to help others in greater need. Can you do that if you are desperately hanging on to your possessions to assert your power over others, or as a measure of your worth? God measures the worth of a person much more directly. He hung upon the cross to show how precious each person is. Can anything you own measure up to that kind of “worth”?

Wealth has become a god to many people in the U. S. and in the Church. As God did with the Israelites before, he will bring us into hardship if that is the only way to wake us up to his presence again. Each Christian, each church, and the nation stand at the mercy of the one true God. It is perilous to ignore him or his laws. Are we seeing God’s removal of his protective hand in real time now? Neither the United States nor the Church can stand without God. Think on that, and marvel that our God is so merciful and longsuffering.

Marsha McRary, Chairperson, called a special meeting of the Church Council on Sunday, August 15th after the worship service.

Bleaka Hollar for Monte Hollar, Chairman of the Trustees, brought up a roof leakage problem over the area of the lobby. Not only were that bad leaks, but the base of the roof has spongy places, that could signal structural problems, too. The Council voted to ask Monte to get three estimates for repairs, and get the problem fixed. A temporary repair has already been done.

Church Council Meeting, August 29th

Attendees: Pastor Alan, Irene Austin, Ted Daniel, Roy Hamby, Bleaka Hollar, Monte Hollar, Peggy Jenkins, JoAnn Knepp, Judy McCrary, Marsha McCrary (Chair), Linda Moretz, Cindy Satterwhite, Cindy Sears, Kenny Silver, and Becky Clark.

Scripture reading came from Hebrews 10:19-25. Marsha called the meeting to order at 4:00 p.m. Devotional reading was from the Upper Room. Theme: Life Together. Spur one another on to love and care of each other. Do not give up meeting together. We have personal time with God, yet we need to meet together, too, with fellow believers. "Christian communities are precious gifts from God."

Marsha said the opening prayer. Reading of the minutes. Irene made a motion to accept. Passed as written.

FINANCIAL REPORT – Irene Austin

Down about \$6,420.00 for the year (more spent than brought in). Irene mentioned the need for roof repairs, and said that we can borrow the needed funds if necessary. Monte Hollar made a motion to accept Irene's report; Kenny Silver seconded. Report accepted as presented.

TRUSTEES REPORT – Monte Hollar

Monte Hollar: received two reports back for estimates on the roof repair. Piedmont has a 5 yr warranty on their work. Their estimate is \$19,700. Monte knows this man, and believes he does good work. He does top grade roofing. JCS Roofing gave an estimate between 17,500 and 18,500. Monte does not know this one. He is waiting on the Barger Ash bid for the job.

Marsha: "Does the whole section need to be done?" Monte: "Yes." Roy suggested we wait for Barger Ash to give us their bid. This is on hold for now, but we must decide soon. Suggestion: put in the bulletin that people can donate money specifically to this project. The BBQ money can be used for this also. Irene will contact the bank to determine loan terms.

Monte also reported that our church buildings have been sprayed for bugs.

OLD BUSINESS

Community Fun Day went well.

Thank you to all the volunteers who helped. Kim's mission's fundraiser was a success, raising over \$500 for her trip to Romania.

Safe Sanctuary guidelines need to be followed better. We should lock the double doors to upstairs when having Sunday School. We have had people wander into the church during this time (strangers). Discussion. We will review Safe Sanctuary guidelines and decide what needs to be done. Monte will check into making all doors to outside to have panic bars, so they can be locked during Sunday school time.

The front door needs some repair. Monte is going to do this soon.

NEW BUSINESS

Copier: Difficult to find anyone leasing copiers now. Full service copier/printers are expensive. We could add more money into the loan for the new roof, if necessary. Discussion.

Cindy Sears reported that the Newsletter mailing is running out of names for bulk mailing. Maybe we can stop the bulk mailing, and send it out only to the homebound and those who really want it. Discussion.

Monte and Cindy will do some research and report at next meeting about a new copier/printer.

Linda Moretz reported that she will be on vacation Sept. 4-11. She will miss cleaning that week. She asked someone to check around and make sure garbage is removed and placed outside.

Irene Austin has volunteered to be our new blood drive coordinator. She will get with Ricky Baker and set a January date, and then schedule the drive with the American Red Cross.

PASTOR'S REPORT

Covid-19: Conference suggest Strongly that we wear masks inside during worship.

What will we do if we have an outbreak here? Parking lot or CLC worship with social distancing? Go back into CLC until something happens?

Roy Hamby made a motion to return to the CLC for worship for now. Pastor said that we should stop the passing of the peace, too. Masking is

highly recommended. Motion seconded by Monte. Passed. We will return to worship in the CLC beginning on Sunday, September 5.

The Pastor brought up his idea for a **Time of Prayer and Discernment**. He wants to begin times of directed prayer for each week (a week of praying for our former, living pastors, specific schools, the district superintendent, the Bishop, etc.) Everything will start on Homecoming and run to Easter Sunday next year. In that six-month period, he wants small groups of people to gather in people's homes for focused prayer groups two times. First meeting would concentrate on where Ebenezer has been. And what do we do now? He says this will be "grief work" to help us deal with the loss of members in the past few years. The second meeting (about 3 months later) will concentrate on asking God where he wants us to go now. These meetings and prayer activities will help us prepare for the upcoming split of the UMC organization.

The Church Council gave Pastor Alan a vote of confidence to proceed with this proposal.

We have had two responses from the first twenty letters sent out to members who have stopped attending Ebenezer. Pastor Alan gave us 19 more names. One name was removed by the Council. Letters will be sent to the remaining eighteen in September.

The Thank Bank through September will go to UMCOR. More information is in the September newsletter.

Cindy Sears said we need to start committee recruitment for 2022; and passed out forms to fill-out for the upcoming Charge Conference, which is set for October 24th at 4:00 p.m.

Pastor Alan reported that he has stopped the Renfro Trust grant process, because of complications in the paperwork. He will consider this at another time. The Both/And grant work is still in process.

Because of his schedule this fall to go to his daughter's wedding on November 6, All Saint's Sunday and Communion will be on October 31st, and Laity Sunday will be moved to November 7th (when he will be out of town.)
