"DEATH"

Then death and Hades were thrown into the lake of fire. —Revelation 20:14 (NIV)

We were made to be eternal beings, because we are made in the image of God—Who is Eternal. The question for us is: do we have eternal *life* with God or eternal *death* without God?

The Tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil was denied to Adam and Eve in the garden—not the Tree of Life until after they rebelled against God. And the LORD God commanded the man, "You are free to eat from any tree in the garden; but you must not eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, for when you eat of it you will surely die." Genesis 2: 16-17. As long as we continue to try to usurp God's rule and make our own rules, we are barred from the Tree of Life. But those who refuse to believe are dead already (John 3:36)—and are headed for eternal death.
